Named in honor of the late **Carolyn Markuson**, a longtime NESLA member, and a mentor and inspiration for school librarians throughout the region, the Carolyn Markuson Innovation Grant was established by NESLA to encourage the development of innovative projects in K-12 schools by School Librarians in the New England region.

The 2022-23 Grant was awarded to Ariel Dagan, Library Media Specialist at Tri County Regional Vocational Technical High School, Franklin, Massachusetts. The Grant enabled Ariel to establish an interactive unit designed to provide students with a critical look at their use of mobile cellular devises, and an understanding of the multiple factors that may play a role in determining whether those device use habits are a sign of addictive behavior.

## **Grant Details:**

- Funding is up to \$500.
- Grant recipients will also receive an initial payment or renewal for one year's membership in ALA and AASL.
- Applications for the 2022-23 school year are due by April 3, 2023.
- The successful grant award will be announced by May 31, 2023.
- Projects for the 2022-23 school year begin between September 2023 to March 1, 2024, and are to be completed by April 30, 2024.

- Projects in progress and planned projects in need of financial assistance are eligible.
